Open book. 75 marks. 40% of A-level

Coursework:	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Non-exam assessment: Theory and independence What's assessed: • Study of two texts: one poetry and one prose text, informed by study of the Critical Anthology • Two essays of 1250–1500 words, each responding to a different text and linking to a different aspect of the Critical anthology • 50 marks. 20% of A-level. Assessed by teachers. Moderated by AQA.

Key Information: The English Language A Level course is a two-year, linear curriculum. The qualification is 80% examination based and 20% coursework.

What are the best ways to revise for this subject?	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Self-Testing: Use flash cards to cover each key text for revision. It is a good idea to focus on a text's opening, the major turning points and then the close. 2. Your file notes: revise by using all of the notes you have taken in class. These are your best revision resource. 3. Teacher feedback: review all of your assessed work and look at the feedback your teachers have given for improvement. Use this as a starting point in order to write your next essay. 4. Past Papers: Answer individual questions from past A Level papers. Make sure you know the question types and timings. 5. Quizlet is a useful resource for checking your knowledge of key quotations.
