

Pupil Premium Report 2016 -2017 – Coombe Dean School

Overview: The Pupil Premium was introduced in April 2011, and paid by means of a specific grant for pupils registered as eligible for Free School Meals in reception to Year 11 or those who are looked after by the Local Authority. The Pupil Premium is used by Coombe Dean to address underlying inequalities between children eligible for the fund and others.

Objectives:

- The Pupil Premium will be used to provide additional educational support to improve the progress and to raise the standard of achievement for these pupils.
- The funding will be used to narrow and close the gap between the achievement of these pupils and their peers.
- As far as possible the school will use the additional funding to address any underlying inequalities between children eligible for Pupil Premium and others. We will ensure that the additional funding reaches the pupils who need it most and that it makes a significant impact on their education and general development.
- The school has identified 5 key areas that are a focus for the work of staff that work specifically on Pupil Premium matters as well as all staff across the school. These 5 areas are:
Quality First Teaching, Raising Staff Awareness, Attendance, Curriculum Enrichment and Curriculum Entitlement, Parental Engagement.

This document should be read in conjunction with the Pupil Premium Raising Achievement Plan for 2016-17 which includes an impact assessment of the measures undertaken.

Headline financials:

In 2016 - 2017 we had 210 students for whom the school will receive the additional funding.

This accounted for 24.5% of the school population. The national average is 28%.

In 2016 -2017 the school received a total of **£229,657** in additional funds.

Headline figures: Below is a summary of the results achieved by the children in receipt of Pupil Premium funding at GCSE level in 2016-17, as well as a comparison to the previous year.

The overarching aim of our Pupil Premium strategy is to raise the performance of our Pupil Premium students so that they are in line with the national performance of non-Pupil Premium students referred to as 'others'.

English: The English results this year were exemplary, out-performing the previous years' results, with an average English P8 score of 0.4. Students entitled to Pupil Premium achieved an overall Progress 8 score of 0 – in line with the national average for all students and an improvement of approaching half a grade on the previous year's outcomes.

Maths: The maths results were equally as strong, and progress made by students entitled to Pupil Premium was also 0 – in line with the national average for all students. This also represented an improvement of 4/10th of a grade on the previous year.

Science: There was little change in the outcomes achieved by all students and the students entitled to Pupil Premium between 2016 and 2017 outcomes.

Spending Summary 2016 – 2017: The spending of the extra funds was split into five main categories – Quality First Teaching, Raising Staff Awareness, Attendance, Curriculum Enrichment and Curriculum Entitlement, Parental Engagement and further detail on the plans and action within each category is available via the ‘PP RAP’ – Pupil Premium Raising Achievement Plan. The overall aim in each of these was to ensure that all Pupil Premium students were equipped to learn and that any gaps that there were in their attainment were identified and addressed. Within each category there were various strategies that were used to fulfil these aims. In line with Government advice the funding received was not tied to individual students but spent where the need was greatest.

EXPENDITURE

Quality First Teaching - £126,805

Tutoring aimed specifically where gaps were identified with a focus on English and maths, additional staffing in English, maths and science.

Raising Staff Awareness - £30,859

Funds used to support the progress and profile of Pupil Premium students directed at championing the profile among staff across the school, including administrative support

Attendance - £41,867

Work of staff to promote attendance and attendance rewards aimed at supporting the attendance of PP students at school.

Curriculum Enrichment and Curriculum Entitlement - £36,403

Bursary fund aimed at increasing participation and entitlement to extra-curricular opportunities as evidenced in our 2017 survey of all students relating to enrichment and entitlement.

Parental Engagement - £20,529

Primarily used to support work aimed at encouraging and supporting enhanced parental engagement

This meant that the overall total amount that was spent in 2016 – 2017 was **£256,400**

Summary: The aim of this funding is to “close the gap” in achievement between those students who are considered to be “Pupil Premium” and those who are not. What matters to us are the individual needs of students are often very specific and unique. The range and nature of the support that we offer listed above, to ensure that Coombe Dean School is a place that PP students are given every chance of making accelerated progress to close the attainment gap.

Quality First Teaching - £94,713

Small group and individual tutoring aimed specifically where gaps were identified with a focus on English and maths. Additional staffing in English, maths and science to provide a seventh set in Key Stage 4. Work on developing pedagogy to improve standards of literacy and learning specifically.

Raising Staff Awareness - £32,504

Funds used to support the progress of Pupil Premium students through the raising of staff awareness to support identification and work with these students.

Attendance - £21,382

Work of staff to promote attendance of students.

Curriculum Enrichment and Curriculum Entitlement - £27,687

Bursary fund aimed at increasing participation and entitlement with additional focus on PP+ students.

Parental Engagement - £21,474

Primarily used to support work aimed at encouraging and supporting enhanced parental engagement with the school and with school activities, support and opportunities.
